

# 02-08 Lecture: The Church's Mission of Reconciliation and Inner Peace

## Theme

The Church's core mission—and that of its members—is to be instruments of salvation, acting as the salt of the earth and light of the world, reconciling people with God and with one another. This calls believers to be distinct from the world by cultivating inner peace through relationship with God, enabling them to heal rather than divide in an age of intense diabolical activity, fragmentation, and emotionalism.

## Key Points

1. Jesus's mission was to reconcile humanity with God and with one another, breaking down walls of hostility.
2. We are living in a time where diabolical activity, division, and corruption are at an all-time high.
3. Believers are called to be different from the world—to be the “salt of the earth and light of the world,” not led by emotion over truth and reason.
4. To bring peace to others, one must first be reconciled with God and have inner peace; we cannot give what we do not possess.
5. When people lose sight of God, peace disintegrates and violence proliferates to unimaginable degrees.
6. The discernment of spirits is crucial to know whether something is from God, human origin, or the devil.
7. Joy and humor are signs of the presence of the Spirit of Jesus; where joylessness reigns, the Spirit is absent.
8. The upcoming parish mission is designed for interior transformation, renewal, and strengthening the community in their inner lives.
9. God provides the grace and tools needed to live a devout life, instructing and guiding those who seek Him.
10. Despite challenges and hardships, believers are “more than conquerors” through the love of God in Christ Jesus.

## Topics

### 1. The Mission of Reconciliation

Jesus came to reconcile humanity with God and one another, breaking down the dividing wall of enmity. The Church’s mission is to be the instrument of this salvation. Satan seeks to thwart this plan by fostering hostility and division—often through malicious speech. Jesus’s work is to establish peace and create one new person in place of the two, reconciling both with God through the cross.

- God designed humans for communion with Him and with one another.
- Sin caused division, beginning with Adam hiding from God.
- Jesus came to restore right relationship with God and each other.
- The enemy builds walls of hostility, suspicion, and hatred.
- **Being Salt and Light in a Divided World**

In an age of intense diabolical activity, widespread division, and emotionalism, the Lord calls His Church to be different—to act as the salt of the earth and light of the world. This requires the spiritual gift of discernment to distinguish God’s will from other influences, as many are misled and agitated. We must be healers, not dividers, and this is only possible if we first possess inner peace.

- We live in a time of high diabolical activity and division, with many led by emotions rather than truth.
- The Lord says to His Church, “You must be different. You can’t act like everyone else.”
- Pray for the gift of discerning spirits to know what is from God, human origin, or the devil.
- Corruption in leadership is high; we must not contribute to riling people up.
- **The Foundation of Inner Peace**

True peace flows from reconciliation with God. As Pope Benedict XVI teaches, only those in harmony with God and themselves can establish peace in the world. We cannot give what we do not have. Without time spent allowing God to build us up, we will add to the disorder and chaos of the world. When people lose God, peace disintegrates and violence proliferates.

- To be peacemakers, we must first be reconciled with God.
- Without inner peace, we cannot bring peace to others.
- If we don't let the Lord strengthen us, we'll act like everyone else, spreading chaos and hatred.
- Jude warns that those devoid of the Holy Spirit will cause divisions in the last days.

- **Tools for Spiritual Strength and Mission**

God has given us the tools to live a devout life. We must be “self-possessed” in all circumstances—knowing our identity in Christ and responding prayerfully rather than reacting emotionally. The upcoming all-family parish mission is aimed at deep interior transformation and renewal, strengthening intimacy with God, and empowering the parish to share God's grace with others.

- God has provided everything needed to live devoutly; we must pursue it.
- Being “self-possessed” means knowing who you are in Christ and responding in prayer, not reacting to chaos.
- The Church's task is to bring people into relationship with God for interior healing and transformation.
- The parish mission seeks interior renewal, deeper intimacy with God, and greater capacity to celebrate the sacraments and share grace.

- **Finding Joy Amid Challenges**

Even amid challenges, frustration, and negativity, we are called to joy. Pope Benedict taught that where joy and humor are absent, the Spirit of Jesus is absent. Joy is a sign of grace. We are “more than conquerors” through Christ and must trust that God's love is stronger than any challenge. This joy should be evident in worship and ministry.

- A Protestant pastor advised a group of priests: “Stay in God's word and just try to be positive.”
- The speaker's parish is doing relatively well compared with others facing significant struggles.
- St. Paul reminds us we are “more than conquerors,” and God's love is stronger than any challenge.
- The parish mission aims to increase joy within the community.

## **Suggestions**

- We need to pray earnestly for the gift of discerning spirits.
- Aim to be self-possessed in all circumstances.

### **AI Suggestions**

- Core focus: “Inner Peace as the Foundation for Mission.” Begin with a daily reflection on your inner peace through simple self-assessment and prayer.
- Core content of “Inner Peace as the Foundation for Mission”: To be effective salt and light who bring God’s peace to a divided world, you must first be reconciled with God and cultivate inner peace. You cannot give what you do not possess.
